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Irish House Leased as Inn

The lease is in effect for 4 years. According to Mr. Ceriotti, the lease includes property that extends down to the beach area, thereby making said property available for use by registered guests.

Ticked Off

In the early 1970s an unusual outbreak of arthritis in children occurred in a rural community near Lyme, Connecticut. The medical community and researches were puzzled as to what was causing these symptoms, typically after a characteristic localized rash appeared.

The cause was later discovered to be a bacterial infection (Borrelia burgdorferi) transmitted by the deer tick (Ixodes scapularis); and the condition was named Lyme disease. Lyme disease may cause symptoms affecting the skin, nervous system, heart and/or joints of an individual. Over 95,000 cases have been reported to the New York State Department of Health since Lyme disease became reportable in 1986.

According to the Franklin County Health Department, these ticks are widely distributed throughout our area. They are active in late spring through early fall and reside in woody and bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.

Keep ticks off your skin. Cover up. Wear long pants, long sleeves, and long socks. Tuck pant legs into socks or boots and tuck shirts into pants. Wash your clothes with hot water and dry them using high heat for at least one hour.

<u>Check your body for ticks and remove them</u> with fine-tipped tweezers, avoiding tick fluids by wearing gloves or using tissue. Grasp the tick near the mouth parts as close to the skin as possible. Gently pull the tick in a steady, upward motion. Disinfect the bite site with soap and water, rubbing alcohol or hydrogen peroxide.

Record the date and location of the tick bite and inform your health care provider and watch for early symptoms of disease over the next few weeks.

Adirondack Carousel Open

Culmination of a Dream

Twelve years ago, local woodcarver Karen Loffler had a dream – a community carousel that would have wood carved Adirondack animals to ride instead of the usual carousel horses. The realization of that dream initially seemed impossible, but local artisans and volunteers, grants and contributions over the years were responsible for the actualization of that dream, which has been described as a community triumph.

Opening Ceremony

The carousel grand opening took place Saturday, May 26 at noon, at which time the opening ceremony commenced with a prayer led by Rev. Randy Cross and a presentation describing the history of the project by Marge Glowa of Onchiota, who has led the \$1 million dollar project since 2009. Invited guest speakers included U.S. Rep. Bill Owens, State Senator Betty Little, Assemblywoman Janet Dupree and Saranac Mayor Clyde Rabideau.

First Rides

First to ride the carousel were the wood carvers, followed by a group of 15 children representing the Saranac area's three elementary schools. The artists who had painted the animals and Adirondack landscapes and wildflowers on the carousel rounding board cap got the third ride. After that, the rides were opened up for free to the anxiously waiting line of people that extended to the sidewalk.

It is expected that the carousel will draw tourists and carousel enthusiasts to Saranac Lake; and that charging for rides, selling season passes, and conducting associated events and concerts will ensure its sustainability.

Aquatic nuisance species can hitch a ride on our clothing, boats, and items used in the water. Before bringing boats or other items used in another body of water to Loon Lake, employ the following simple procedure:

- Remove any visible mud, plants, fish or animals before transporting equipment
- Eliminate water from equipment before transporting
- Clean and dry anything that came in contact with water (Boats, trailers, equipment, clothes, dogs,

Never release plants, fish or animals into a body of water unless they came out of that body of water

Please be considerate by:

- Steering Clear of us, especially if we have chicks, when boating.
- Not driving us away from sheltered areas into open areas where boat traffic is heavy.
- Using non-lead fishing sinkers and jigs.
- Packing out your line. Invisible in the water, lost or cut fishing line can entangle us and other wildlife, often with fatal results.
